More about Pixie from the humans:

Service dogs need to have a laidback, go with the flow temperament with an interest in working with someone with a disability. Pixie is specifically being released from our program due to her activity level and talkativeness – she doesn't have the "go with the flow" laidback temperament needed for service dog work and hasn't shown much interest in Diabetic Alert Dog work. When she gets fixated on something, it's difficult to get her attention.

Pixie is a smart, active, and somewhat independent girl. She loves people and has been great with the well-behaved children she has interacted with. She has a history of getting car sick, but that has greatly improved as she's gotten older.

Please note that she does require regular grooming. We have trimmed Pixie (with an electric shaver) several times and she is very comfortable with it -- she usually lays down and rests while being shaved.



As mentioned above, we think that Pixie will thrive in a calmer environment where she can develop a bond with her new people and have all the love, attention and patience that she deserves.
